Permissible	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can speak to and visit representatives, legislators, policy makers for educational, informational purposes - Educate public on issues, so long as it does not express a position on current or anticipated legislation - Can lobby as long as you stay under lobbying cap - Can influence votes on policy either through grassroots lobbying or for ballot measures - Can provide information and technical assistance to agencies of state - Invite elected officials to speak or to events - Host candidate forums that are educational and all candidates have been invited - Non partisan voter guides - Non partisan get out the vote and voter registration - Legal action brought in by courts - Attempts to influence actions of administrative bodies - Non partisan analysis that examine pros & cons of a policy 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Can electioneer for candidates to a limit - Can do unlimited lobbying
Not-permissible	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Cannot campaign or express support for candidates for public office - Candidate endorsements - Contributions to candidates, political parties - Partisan "Get Out the Vote" and voter registration 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - If a section 501(c)(4) organization does not solicit funds for political purposes, but makes contributions or expenditures of more than \$50,000 in a year, or \$100,000 in a four-year period, it also becomes a recipient committee and

		must disclose donors who have donated \$1000 or more).
